Dear Judge Stephens:

On September 30, 2025, the Court entered an Order [ECF 39] directing the Oklahoma County Criminal Justice Authority ("OCCJA") to submit a Special Report. Please note that OCCJA filed an Answer [ECF 36] in the case on September 25, 2025, and that Plaintiff is represented by counsel.

The Plaintiff, Brittany M. Gordon ("Gordon"), injured her 9-year-old daughter, herself, and another driver, Carolyn K. Wright, on June 20, 2024, at about 11 am by falling asleep at the wheel. Exhibit "1," Probable Cause Affidavit, Julian Manzo, Edmond Police Department, June 20, 2024. Gordon's 9-year-old daughter was taken by ambulance to OU Children's Hospital. *Id.* Ms. Wright was taken to a hospital not yet identified. *Id.* Plaintiff claimed falling asleep at the wheel was caused by fatigue. *Id.* Plaintiff claimed falling asleep at the wheel was a disclosed risk of the medication she was taking. *Id.* Plaintiff was charged with in the Oklahoma County District Court No. CF-2024-3210 with Child Endangerment and Driving Under the Influence – Personal Injury Accident. *Id.*

The investigating Edmond police officer, Julian Manzo, was using the body cam provided by the city. OCCJA does not have a complete copy of the police officer's body cam footage. A digest of the assumed several hours of body cam footage was created by a news outlet. See, YouTube, <https://youtu.be/n0EA0T06iTU?si=jzrCEf6iRAW6MAD9>, NonDoc Media (last viewed October 9, 2025).

The arresting officer noted the erratic behavior of Gordon and “observed multiple clues of intoxication.” Exhibit “1,” Probable Cause Affidavit, Julian Manzo, Edmond Police Department, June 20, 2024. The YouTube video supports the observations reported by the police officer.

Gordon was brought by Edmond police officer Nathan Fountain to the Oklahoma County Detention Center, which is operated by the OCCJA. OCCJA took over operational control on July 1, 2020. Gordon was booked. Exhibit “2,” Facility Admission Report, June 20, 2024, at 2330 hours (1130pm). Accompanying Plaintiff was the Edmond Police Department authorization “to administer medical treatment.” Exhibit “3,” Medical Treatment Authorization, June 20, 2024. The OU Medical Center treated Plaintiff and then released her to the custody of a police officer. *Id.* Thus, on arrival, it would have appeared to OCCJA that twelve (12) hours had elapsed from the time of the auto accident and that Gordon received treatment as needed at the hospital.

During booking at the jail, which started about 1800 hours (8pm), Gordon was taken to the various workstations: “morpho,” “medical evaluation,” and “pat down.” When Plaintiff reached the “pat down” area, at about 854pm, the expectation was that her personal property and shoes would be collected for storage, and she would be searched. Handcuffs would be removed. Gordon decided to leave the “pat down” area without authorization.

Exhibit “4” (filed conventionally with software needed for playback), Jail Video, depicts Gordon and Officer Fountain entering a “pat down” at 854pm. There is no audio recording. The histrionics have to be assessed from facial expressions and movement. Gordon was directed where to stand. At 855pm, Gordon attempted to leave. Officer Fountain moved to block her forward progress and put out his hand. The video clearly indicated he did not push her. Gordon fell down, probably due to her intoxication combined with her agitated emotional state, but not due to Officer Fountain. Gordon is helped from the floor by Officer Fountain and detention officer Yoseline Zamora. Also present by the time Gordon is again standing at 856pm are detention officers Jonathan Geissler, Dejuan Wilson, and Angela Martinez. It takes four detention officers to conduct pat down by 856:50. A fifth detention officer, Julia Fall, is required to assist by 857:50. Pat down is completed by 900pm, and Gordon is escorted to a medical assessment, where she is seated by 902pm.

The second video in Exhibit “4,” is titled “Timeline” and is a camera that served the body scanner area. Gordon arrived at the scanner about 11 pm. By 1102pm, Gordon is directed to the scanner and walks to it unassisted and without a limp. Her walk is witnessed by several officers as well as the camera.

Gordon claimed she was injured, not in the auto accident, and not while in the legal custody of the OCCJA, but by being knocked down by the transporting City of Edmond police officer during booking while at the jail. Custody does not transfer until the booking is completed. Gordon did not and does not claim that any detention officer used force.

Booking at the jail included a medical assessment, too. Gordon could not recall what medications or other substances she ingested. Exhibit "5," Full Patient History, at 2 (filed under seal). Gordon reported she was diagnosed with bipolar. *Id.*, at 2. Plaintiff complained of ankle pain that the intake registered nurse took to be a sequela of the auto accident. *Id.*, at 3. The pain complaint was not such that the registered nurse felt compelled to ignore the "fitness for incarceration" issued by OU Medical Center that examined Gordon and released her to the custody of the police officer. Gordon appeared to the registered nurse to be intoxicated just as she appeared to the arresting police officers. *Id.*, at 3.

Gordon was released on June 21, 2024, after she posted bail. Exhibit "6," Detailed Release Report. She was incarcerated for 17 hours and 42 minutes. *Id.*

OCCJA's review of the Gordon booking, both at the time and now, was "informal." Because there did not appear to be an "incident" at the jail, other than of Gordon's own making due to her histrionics, no formal investigation was conducted. As a result of Gordon's media campaign, the Federal Bureau of Investigation may also have investigated. They requested from us a copy of the jail video produced herewith. However, the extent, content, and determinations, if any, of the investigation are not known.

OCCJA's review of the booking found no improper conduct by anyone. OCCJA considers the lawsuit frivolous and will defend it accordingly.
